The Campus will offer a doorway to opportunity, empowerment, choice, and hope. From this place of connection, we build trust, spark hope, and open doors for transformation. When lived experience informs service, it is more effective and more accepted by people experiencing mental health and addiction crisis.

WHAT WE DO

Peer support is a non-clinical, highly-effective and powerful adjunct to the medical model. As Oregon's leader in peer support, we help individuals seeking mental health and/or substance use recovery across the tri-county area, and workforce development programs statewide and nationally.

WHO WE ARE

MHAAO is the largest peer-run nonprofit in Oregon with 130 specialists supporting people everyday. Having navigated the same complex systems and experienced similar barriers to care, we are uniquely qualified to help others. Our staff are living proof that people can and do recover.
